What is this 'breakdown'?

It is a complete list of employees from the Operations Manager down, and how much space each Department is occupying.

Do you handle any work for Tektronix Limited?

Yes, we hold the initial tests for prospective new employees. We also keep a record for both Companies of the beneficiaries of the Retirement Trust and all their correspondence for the hospitalization scheme as Walt is B.U.P.A. Group Secretary for both Companies.

Do you find employees keep you informed of changes in their address, etc?

I am afraid people tend to forget to let us know of these changes, and they are important for keeping the companies up to date.

What are the tests which job applicants take?

There are some Tektronix-Approved I.Q. tests that all applicants take. Then we have aptitude tests for technicians, assembly workers, and clerical staff. Also production staff must have a colour vision test.

Do you have any direct connection with the running of the canteen?

No, not the day-to-day running. However, we are responsible for stocktaking the stores at the end of every three months. Theses figures are given to Accounts who in turn let Bob Gwynn know how the Canteens are running financially.

No. 2 Doris Molony ... Personnel

How long have you been with the company, Doris?

Two and a half years.

Where were you before you joined Tektronix?

Here on Guernsey, I was a dental nurse-receptionist, and on the mainland I was with Southern Instruments, Camberley, as a receptionist.

Who are the other members of Personnel?

Walt Morrison is Personnel Manager. In the personnel office, there is myself and Carol Jouhning. There is the switchboard operator, Annette Courtney, and the trainees Shirley Drouet and Susan Stonebridge. Walt is also responsible to the Operations Manager for Building Services, the Facilities Group and the two Canteens.

What other aspects of the day to day running of the Company are handled by your Department?

We are responsible for Safety Regulations, first aid and all correspondence for the hospitalization scheme. We handle all the copying and duplicating in the Company There is an electric duplicating machine and a photocopier at Victoria Avenue, and recently a Xerox copier has been installed at La Villiaze. The handling of travel and Hotel bookings is carried out from our office.

What travel arrangements are these?

These are for members of the staff who are visiting the mainland on Company business to attend exhibitions or training courses. We also arrange accommodation in the island for Tektronix Personnel visiting us from other locations, and for trade representatives who are making an overnight stay in the island.

What are your personal responsibilities in the office?

I keep our personnel records up to date for inclusion in our monthly Personnel report. This in turn is included in the Operations report which goes to Beaverton. Every quarter I do a personnel and area breakdown.

Does the hiring of new staff go on throughout the year?

It does, though we get a lot more enquiries whilst we are advertising various positions. Also in the summer we have a great number of enquiries from visitors, but, of course, we do not normally employ anyone who is not resident in the island. The only exception being for certain test or staff engineering vacancies.

Do we have a waiting list?

Yes, there is quite a long one for applicants - the female listis not so long - we have a steady turnover of female assembly workers.

Do you have problems by not being at La Villiaze?

We have small problems - the one which I think probable effects us most is when we are hiring people for La Villiaze. After I have given them their Aptitude Tests, I have to arrange another appointment for them to see Walt at La Villiaze, after which they are passed on to the relevant department. This is the easiest way of working it.

How do applicants react to the 'fringe benefits' of Tektronix?

They are usually very impressed, particularly with the hospitalization scheme, and retirement trust. The profit sharing also appeals to them, of course, although most of them have heard about it before applying, whereas they usually have not heard of the other benefits.



Staff Engineering

The latest round of alterations at La Villiaze which included re-siting the conference room has resulted in our Staff Engineering Department being enlarged.

The extra space has allowed running water and an air line to be installed in Staff Engineering, these will be used in conjunction with new "salt-spray" equipment for checking the quality of various material finishes.

Early this month a new piece of equipment arrived which looked rather like "Madame Guillotine". It was in fact a new "Helmholtz Coil". This equipment is used by incoming inspection to check the screening efficiency of C.R.T. shields. Soon after its arrival in Staff Engineering, we received a visit from Alan Martin and John Hayes of Telcon Metals Limited. They brought their Helmholtz coil with them and spent some time with Roy Falla, Bert Crousaz and Dave Inman Calibrating their coil against ours. Thus, we hope, eliminating possible areas of incompatibility between readings taken at European operation. different locations.

H.M.S. Murray visited the island during October in connection with the Charybdis parade and service. There the story might have ended had it not been for the fact that several Teks are members of the Naval Association whose annual dinner is held that weekend.

Show Successes


